The exciting news this week was that we have completed our new All Weather Pitch (AWP), which brings to an end a three-year project. During that time, we needed to secure the funding, design the plans and, ultimately, complete the work. With all building projects, there is always something unexpected and, when the builders removed the old pitch carpet, they found that the stone base was not up to standard. Therefore, a brand new base had to be constructed, which delayed the project by three months. As well as a state of the art pitch surface, we now have new goals and goal recesses, a spectator area, and revamped floodlights. It is true to say that we now have the best 3G pitch in the area!

PE lessons on the pitch will resume after half-term and so I would ask that you make sure you have read the letter sent this week from the PE department regarding appropriate footwear.

The construction of the pitch also means that we can further develop our after school provision and can host competitive Football Association sanctioned games. I am sure that students will enjoy playing on the pitch and I look forward to hearing about their successes.
